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Since our founding in 1938, Western National Parks (formerly Western National Parks Association) has provided more than \$162 million in aid to our partner parks, funding educational materials and programs, interpretive programming, park research projects, and community engagement efforts for the National Park Service (NPS). In fiscal year 2024 (FY24), we provided more than \$14 million in direct and indirect aid to parks. Indirect aid includes essential support through interpretive products, publications, marketing, e-commerce, philanthropy, enhanced visitor services, support for NPS personnel, and the dedicated personnel who serve in our park stores and at outreach events.

In each store, Western National Parks (WNP) staff help visitors connect more deeply to place, offering interpretation, insight, and hospitality that elevates every park experience. That same dedication carried through our digital presence and strategic initiatives in FY24, including significant investments in e-commerce and philanthropy. Our online store continued to grow as a meaningful platform for public lands supporters, while new philanthropic pathways made it easier than ever to give back.

We also launched targeted, cross-platform campaigns to engage new audiences and deepen relationships with park lovers nationwide. These efforts resulted in expanded outreach, stronger community connections, and increased membership in our Park Protector program. At the same time, we laid the groundwork for a bold new chapter in our organization's story. Throughout FY24, we undertook the careful work of developing our refreshed brand identity—Western National Parks. This rebranding process will help us better reflect who we are, whom we serve, and how we show up for parks, people, and place.

With more than 70 partner parks across 12 Western states, our mission remains the same: to connect people to the parks that shape our stories, our history, and our future. In this Annual Report, you'll find highlights from a pivotal year—one defined by momentum, collaboration, and purpose.

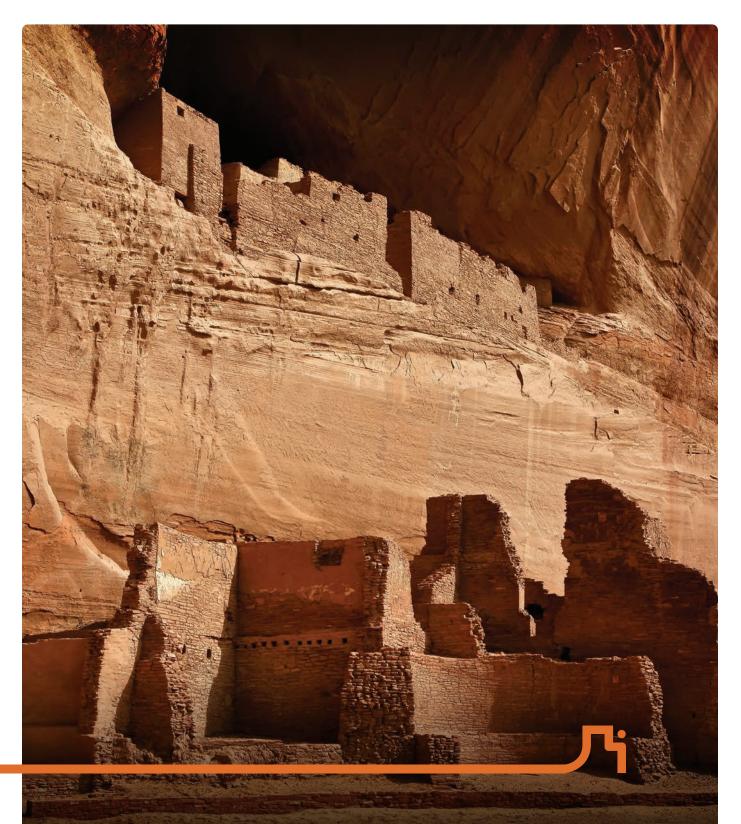

Interpretation: Enhancing Visitor Experiences at Parks

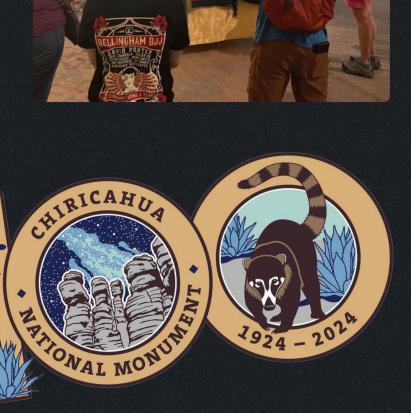
Tule Springs Fossil Beds National Monument's Junior Ranger Paleontology Badges Spark Love of Science

WNPA provided funding for **Tule Springs Fossil Beds National Monument's Junior** Ranger paleontology badges. These badges are given as rewards after participants of any age complete activities designed to teach them more about the park's fascinating natural history.

Montezuma Castle National **Monument Debuts Hopi Textile Display**

Montezuma Castle National Monument. with WNPA support, created a special display in their visitor center highlighting the tradition of Hopi weaving. This interactive exhibit features woven textile samples, an explanation of the processes and the spiritual significance of weaving, and an oversized loom where visitors can try their hand at this textile art.





Chiricahua National Monument Unveils Centennial Logo

In April 2024, Chiricahua National Monument celebrated its 100th anniversary. NPS and the WNPA marketing team worked together and created a unique logo to commemorate the momentous occasion. The design features the park's rhyolite pinnacles, dark skies, and a coatimundi.

Binoculars Enhance Astronomy and Birding Programs at El **Malpais National Monument**

With WNPA support, staff at El Malpais **National Monument** purchased binoculars for use in their night sky and birding programs. This equipment helps visitors closely observe the moon and the rings of Saturn during full moon night hikes. Park visitors also used the binoculars to observe birds and wildlife. Park staff shared that the purchase has been very useful as many park visitors had never closely observed the surface of the moon before.



Research: Stories and Results of Research Projects We Supported







Studying Insects in Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument

Lauren M. Weidner, a dedicated researcher from Arizona State University, is using insects to assess ecosystem health at Organ Pipe Cactus National Monument. Weidner's innovative approach highlights the importance of understanding the intricate relationships within our natural ecosystems.

Studying Chacoan Identity at Aztec Ruins National Monument

Michelle I. Turner is exploring the significance of black pottery at Aztec Ruins National Monument and its relation to Chacoan identity, memory, and power. Turner's research illuminates the cultural significance of pottery in ancient civilizations.

Monitoring Vegetation in Bandelier National Monument

Megan Swan, part of the NPS' Southern Colorado Plateau Inventory and Monitoring Network, is studying the effects of treatment, climate change, and disturbances on vegetation in Piñon Juniper Woodlands in Bandelier National Monument. Swan's research provides critical insights into preserving the ecological balance of this important ecosystem.

Illuminating Traditions in Big Thicket National Preserve

Dr. Andrew S. Veech, from the Intermountain Archaeology Program of the NPS, is uncovering ancestral Atakapa lifeways in **Big Thicket National Preserve**. Dr. Veech's exploration promises to shed light on the rich history and traditions of this unique region.

Investigating Geology in Carlsbad Caverns National Park

Dr. Matthew Covington of the University of Arkansas is investigating the variability in radon and carbon dioxide concentrations within Carlsbad Caverns National Park. Dr. Covington's research will enhance our understanding of the unique geology and environmental factors at play within this stunning national park.

Monitoring Biodiversity in Coronado National Memorial

Melanie Culver, from the University of Arizona and United States Geological Survey (USGS), is monitoring biodiversity using eDNA techniques at Coronado National Memorial. Culver's work offers crucial insights into maintaining the delicate balance of ecosystems along the borderlands.





Education: Inspiring the Next Generation of Park Advocates



Canyon de Chelly Junior Ranger Camp

Canyon de Chelly National Monument's popular Junior Ranger Camp, sponsored by WNPA and Capacity Builders Inc., returned this past summer with a full roster of participants. The kids learned about traditional arts and stories through pottery, weaving, silversmithing, and painting; completed a nature walk; and were sworn in as Junior Rangers.

Two Hundred Fourth Graders Travel to Santa Cruz Island

More than 200 fourth graders visited Channel Islands National Park's Santa Cruz Island to observe marine wildlife and birds, participate in outdoor recreation activities, and learn about sustainability, in what they later said was "The best field trip ever!" WNPA funded boat transportation costs so students could reach this remote national park located off the coast of California.

Summer Programs at Bighorn Canyon

WNPA supported a variety of summer programs at Bighorn Canyon National Recreation Area, including ranger programs, art-in-the-park events geology talks, and other cultural, educational, and interactive events. These interactive and educational programs allowed visitors from all walks of life to learn about and experience this park's unique natural and cultural heritage.

Kids' Activity Booklet Features WNPA Partner Parks

In FY24 with the support of a generous donor, WNPA created the first-ever WNPA Activity Booklet: Adventures in Western National Parks. Written by staff member Julie Thompson and designed by artist Jason King, this fun, interactive, and colorful guide introduces kids of all ages to WNPA's many unique partner parks. WNPA's publishing department helped to develop and coordinate two printings of the booklet.

Camp Owa Chita Summer Program

Thanks to the support of WNPA, Washita

Battlefield National Historic Site hosted
another year of Camp Owa Chita, a free summer
camp for children between first and fourth grade.
The camp connected kids to this significant
natural, cultural, and historical landscape through
creative and culturally relevant art projects and
outdoor recreation.



Community Engagement: Making Public Lands Welcoming for All



Crow Nation Youth Place Flags at Custer National Cemetery

With WNPA support, students from Pretty Eagle Catholic Academy joined park staff at Little Bighorn Battlefield National Monument on Memorial Day to place 5,000 US flags on the gravestones at Custer National Cemetery. Those honored included known and unknown veterans, women and children from isolated frontier posts, Native American scouts, and Medal of Honor recipients.

New Mexico Parks Honor the Treaty of Bosque Redondo

El Malpais National Monument, Fort Union National Monument, and Aztec Ruins National Monument commemorated the Treaty of Bosque Redondo with a special event series. The 1868 agreement between the US Government and the Navajo Nation allowed the Diné to return to their homelands after being forcibly removed four years prior. The WNPA-supported commemorations included presentations by Sean Price, historian and director of the Dineh Tah Navajo Cultural Program, and performances by the Dineh Tah Navajo Dancers.

Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park Hosts Annual Astronomy Festival

In September 2024, Black Canyon of the Gunnison National Park hosted AstroFest, a WNPA-supported celebration designed to help visitors appreciate the night sky. As an International Dark Sky Park, Black Canyon of the Gunnison protects some of the darkest skies in the country. The festival featured special programming, telescope viewing, and evening ranger programs.

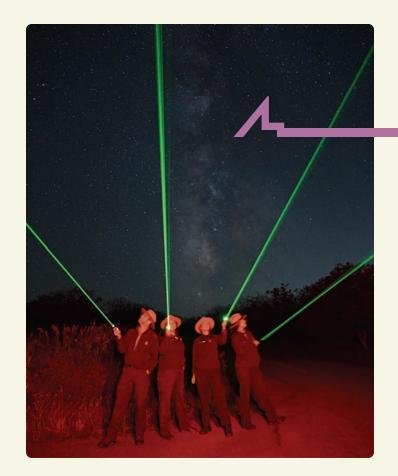
Fort Larned National Historic Site Brings History to Life

Fort Larned National Historic Site hosted living history demonstrations in the park's historic kitchen on Memorial Day with WNPA support. This program enriched visitors' understanding of a complex era, depicting what life for many was like in the 1800s on the isolated frontier post.

Mescalero Apache Crown Dancers Perform at Gila Cliff Dwellings National Monument

In April, with WNPA support, Gila Cliff

Dwellings National Monument hosted a special dance performance. The Mescalero Apache Crown Dancers, one of the many Indigenous peoples with cultural ties to the land the park preserves, performed a ceremonial dance that celebrated ancestors, communities, and traditions.



Brown v. Board of Education National Historical Park Hosts Homecoming

In May 2024, Brown v. Board of Education
National Historical Park celebrated the 70th
anniversary of the landmark US Supreme
Court case that ruled racial segregation
in public schools unconstitutional. WNPA
supported the event by providing a catered
lunch for 200 attendees, including students
and educators of Topeka's four former African
American elementary schools.





Golden Spike National Historical Park Hosts 155th Last Spike Ceremony Celebration

Golden Spike National Historical Park

hosted a living history event marking the 155th Anniversary of the completion of the Transcontinental Railroad. Representatives from the Northwestern Band of Shoshone and the Chinese Railroad Workers participated, helping tell the railroad's complex story and bringing awareness to important, diverse, and historically unrepresented perspectives.



Hubbell on the Road

The WNPA team from <u>Hubbell Trading Post</u>

<u>National Historic Site</u>, the oldest continuously operating trading post on the Navajo Nation,

visited Bandelier National Monument,

Petroglyph National Monument, and The

National Parks Store. Each event featured
authentic Native American weavings and
jewelry for purchase, rug talks from Diné
Trader Wallace James Jr, and demonstrations
by Diné weaver Tonita Yazzie. Hubbell on
the Road events are unique opportunities
to learn about the history, techniques, and
deep significance of the sacred art of Navajo
weaving.

Nicodemus National Historic Site Celebrates 146th Homecoming

Nicodemus National Historic Site, which preserves the oldest and only remaining all-Black settlement west of the Mississippi, held its 146th homecoming and emancipation celebration from July 26 through July 28, 2024. Descendants from all over the country returned to Nicodemus to recognize and celebrate this special community founded by a group of primarily formerly enslaved African Americans who sought a better life following the Civil War. WNPA supported the three-day festival, which featured games, refreshments, music, events, and activities.

Lehman Caves Lint Camp

Lehman Caves at <u>Great Basin National Park</u> is the longest cave system in Nevada. With nearly 30,000 visitors a year leaving behind

dust, dirt, and debris, the impact to the cave's appearance and the animals that live there is substantial. WNPA supported the Lehman Caves Lint Camp, where volunteers successfully removed lint and debris from 2,000 feet of trail in the park's cave system.

Tohono O'odham Saguaro Fruit Harvest

During the hottest part of the year, the Tohono O'odham gather for the harvest of the sacred fruit of the saguaro cactus. At this past year's annual Tucker Family Harvest Camp, Maria Francisco and Tanisha Tucker Lohse carried on the work of the late Stella Tucker, a beloved family member, by sharing their knowledge and friendship with Saguaro National Park staff and other attendees. Maria and Tanisha shared the story and importance of the harvest, how the fruit has been and continues to be used, and taught participants about the saguaro's cultural significance.

Lyndon B Johnson National Historical Park Eclipse Party

Lyndon B Johnson National Historical Park was in the path of totality for the solar eclipse on April 8, 2024, a very special astronomical





event that will not occur over the contiguous United States for several decades. WNPA supported a variety of programs at the park that were free and open to the public, helping visitors safely experience and celebrate this special occasion.

Luminaria Events at Arizona Parks

Luminaria, a Southwest tradition that dates back to at least the 1500s, involves the lighting of farolitos, or bonfire lights. WNPA was proud to support luminaria events at Hubbell Trading Post National Historic Site and Tonto National Monument, where visitors were able to experience these parks illuminated by thousands of these tiny lights. WNPA staff volunteered at both events, which are a beloved part of the holiday traditions for many communities with cultural ties to these parks.





2024 Tucson Festival of Books

WNPA hosted The National Park Experience Pavilion and continued its sponsorship of the Tucson Festival of Books (TFOB), one of the largest book festivals in the country. WNPA hosted renowned authors including David Lipsky, Suzanne Roberts, and Tom Zoellner, booths by our partner parks and other partner organizations, and activities for kids at the Junior Ranger Jamboree. The National Parks Store and Hubbell Trading Post National Historic Site both had retail areas at the festival. Diné trader Wallace James Jr gave insightful talks about the cultural significance of Navajo weaving on both days of the festival. He was joined by Diné weaver Tonita Yazzie.

At the TFOB Authors' Dinner on March 8, 2024, WNPA president and CEO Marie Buck accepted an honor that recognized WNPA's significant sponsorship of the festival since 2011.

Thanks to an anonymous donation, WNPA was able to provide exciting adventure kits to 2,000 kids who visited The Pavilion, including a Junior Ranger backpack, adorable puffy stickers, a multicolor pen, binoculars, and an exciting WNPA activity booklet. Children had the opportunity to engage with our partner

parks and participate in educational natural and cultural activities.

The 2024 festival also marked the return of the high school student essay contest. Sponsored by AdventureKeen, the prompt asked writers to respond to the question "What can the National Park Service do to ensure national parks are inclusive, accessible, and relevant?" The contest had a record number of applicants from schools across the Tucson area. Essays were judged by a diverse panel, with winners receiving cash prizes of \$500 for first place, \$350 for second place, and \$150 for third place. The first-place winner, 11th-grade University High School Student Mallory O'Brien, read her essay in front of the TFOB audience.





WNPA Partnered with AllTrails for a Fall Membership Campaign

WNPA celebrated the fall season and the spirit of the outdoors, partnering with AllTrails, the world's largest and most trusted outdoor platform, for a promotion that ran from October 16 to October 29, 2024. To celebrate the joy of hiking in the vibrant fall settings of WNPA's partner parks, all customers received a free AllTrails+ three-month membership with any purchase made online and at all WNPA-operated park stores.

AllTrails helps get people outside so they can have healthy, authentic experiences and a deeper appreciation of the outdoors.

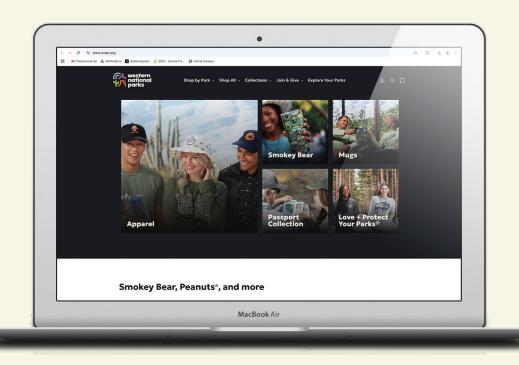

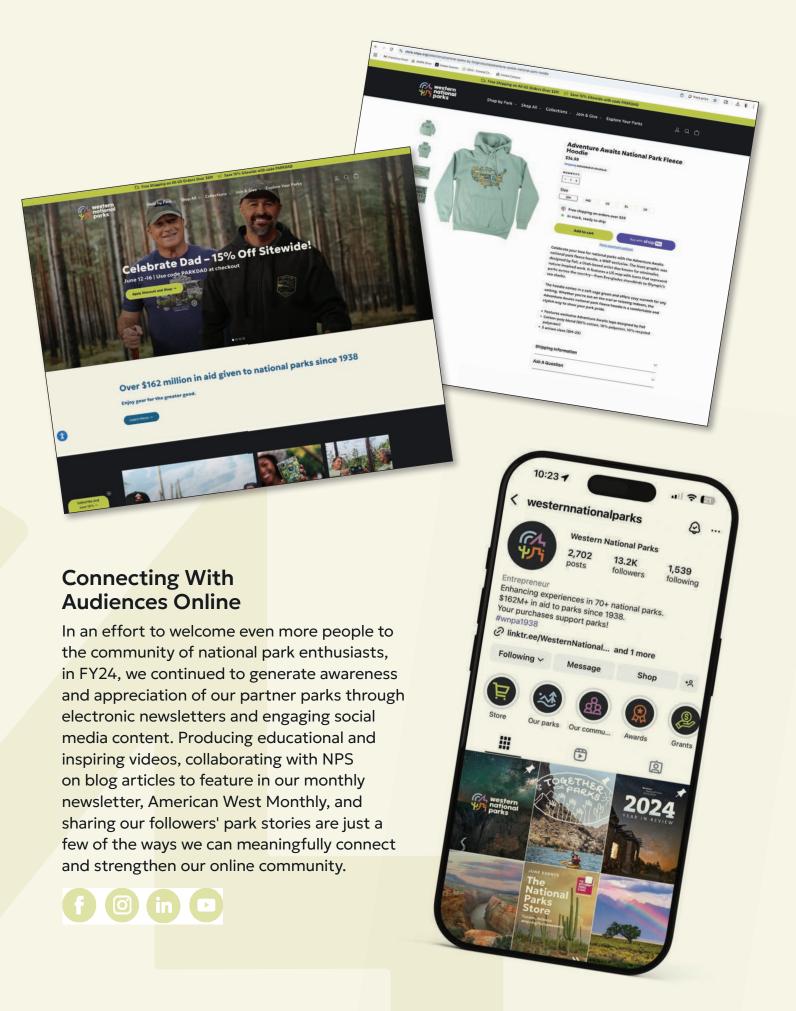

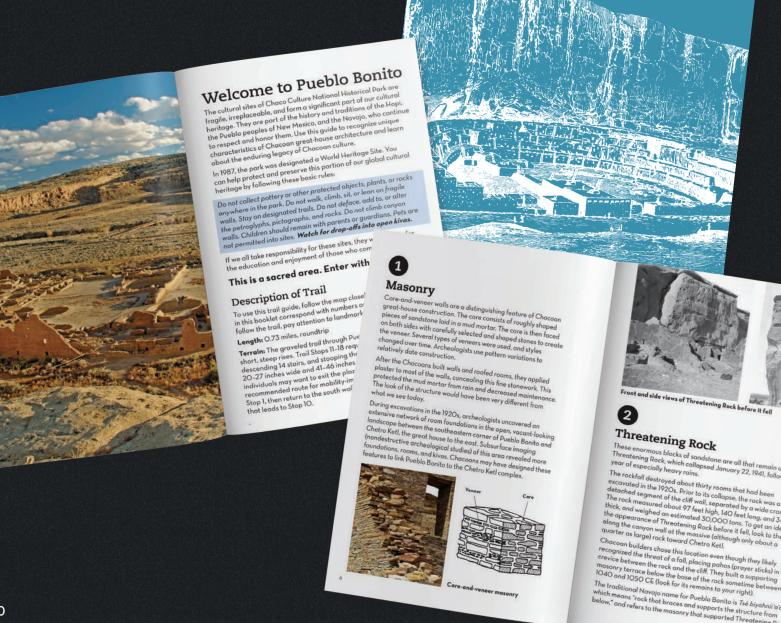

Publishing Spotlight

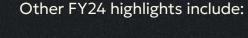
